They are sliced and arranged in a dish, alternating slices of potato with slices of egg, anchovies, herrings, shrimps, green beans or olives etc. The night before - for this salad is prepared in advance give it a bottle of excellent champagne. To serve, pour a small glass of champagne over the salad and season with olive oil, the juice of one lemon, plenty of salt, pepper and mustard.

To all those who dread becoming annoyingly stout, avoid taking breakfast in bed and do not mix your beverage with food. Simply drink a large glass of water at the end of the meal or, preferably, two hours later. Hot breakfast beverages, even tea, are harmful, so should be avoided as much as possible. No bread, but special well toasted crispbread.

The nightstand which used to be seen next to every bed has now completely disappeared from the bedroom, in favour of a larger round table which those who read in bed like to clutter up with books, framed portraits, knick-knacks, notepads and all sorts of bits and pieces. On the other hand, the former bedside tables, in Empire or Restoration style, can be placed in the corner of the bedrooms to display crystal vases brimming over with flowers.
